

Silent Auction



Another Way to Pay Dues for 2025



As noted on page 4 in the Time-to-Pay Dues segment, GHS is in the process of migrating its website from the present Wild Apricot platform to the GoDaddy platform. Once the migration is complete, the site will have new instructions on the dues paying process, including links to join or renew membership. A new benefit is the addition of a QR (Quick Response) code that allows you to use your camera app on your smart phone to access our membership renewal page to pay dues. **This QR code is available for use now.** All you have to do is open the camera app on your smartphone and point it at the QR code shown here. A prompt will appear on your screen as you point the camera at the QR code. Click on the prompt and you will be

taken right to the online form for GHS membership. Note that the form also includes a donation section. This is a donation to the service provider, not GHS, and is optional. However, any little donation you might make does help the society eliminate credit card processing fees.


















Plants and Freezing Temperatures

(Editors Note: This article is courtesy of the author and editor of the East Tennessee Hosta Society's newsletter, Hosta Happenings, January 2024. It helps to explain how different plants react differently to cold temperatures. It also explains why sometimes our plants tolerate extreme cold without damage yet end up with significant damage at other times. It is tailored to Zone 6-7 and East Tennessee, but the information is equally applicable to us in Zones 7b and 8. Accompanying pictures are provided by the editor.)

The short explanation is "Don't worry! Plants have had this handled for millennia." But there is a longer explanation that can involve plant physiology. Here's an explanation in terms everyone should understand.

Different plant species handle freezing temperatures differently based upon where they originated. If the plant originally came from the tropics, it didn't evolve freeze survival mechanisms. This is why it's always useful to know where plants came from. Think about it this way, would you leave a peace lily (Spathiphyllum species and hybrids) out in the wintertime in East Tennessee? No! Of course not. It's a tropical plant coming from places like Mexico, Tropical America, Malesia, and the Western Pacific. Most sources list its hardiness zone as 11a through 12b.

Even with the recent revision of the USDA Hardiness Zone Map, East Tennessee is not that tropical. On the other hand, hardiness zones 3 through 9 are commonly listed for *Hosta*. They can survive freezes in East Tennessee (Zones 6 and 7 depending upon elevation) when they have already gone dormant. That's the key – they go dormant!

So, if its January or February and we have freezing temperatures, herbaceous perennials that are dormant will not suffer freeze damage. Woody plant material will behave differently. During the fall, woody plant materials (trees and shrubs) respond to the shortening daylengths and cooler temperatures to prepare for winter. Leaves go dormant and fall off of deciduous plant species. This reduces the surface area exposed to lower humidity that could result in moisture loss from the foliage.

Also during this period of shorter days and cooler nights, plants increase the amount of sugar, salt or other compounds mixed in the water in their cells – plant antifreeze. Having these chemicals in the cells of tree and shrub branches helps to lower the freezing point of cell sap. They can withstand much colder temperatures. Some plants will also reduce the amount of water in the cells by translocating it into the roots. Dormancy also means plants just aren't growing – they are not doing the things that are needed for growth because they are not producing the carbohydrates in their leaves needed to produce more plant cells. Pretty amazing when you think about it.

So at this time of the year, when plants are dormant, they tend to be much less susceptible to freeze damage.

Now, if we are pushing hardiness zones, that's a different story. In my garden, I'm pushing hardiness zones. I have cast-iron plant (Aspidistra 'Okame' and 'Lennon's Song', both rated for Zones 7b-10b), two unknown amaryllis varieties (Hippeastrum Zones 8-10), and Thai Giant elephant ears (Colocasia gigantea, Zones 8-10).

Yes, we are now Zone 7b in the reclassification. Obviously, I'm pushing my luck with these plants. How do I handle it? Cover them with copious amounts of fallen leaves. The elephant ears and amaryllis are under about a foot of leaves. The cast-iron plants don't receive anything special other than some more mulch around the crowns since they are evergreen.

Camellias are another example of pushing the envelope with hardiness zones. Camellia japonica and C. sasanqua are listed as Zones 7 to 9. So, we are in the northern area of their hardiness zone. Typically, with hard freezes at this time of the year, those winter flowering varieties will experience damage to the flowers because they are actively growing and expanding the flower parts. Flower parts do not undergo the described process of developing dormancy.

Freeze damage will be less obvious at this time of the year. We've had cold weather, plants are dormant. Freeze damage occurs with freakish, early freezes when there is an extreme drop in temperatures. Or, it may occur in the late winter when temperatures start to warm up and plants are coming out of dormancy. Plants have started the processes to begin growth and they become more susceptible to freeze damage.

So, the bottom line is don't worry about doing anything very special for garden plants now! They're dormant. Start paying attention in March as plants are coming out of their dormancy then. The vernal equinox is March 19, 2024 (it will be March 20, 2025. – the editor); days and nights are now equal length. Plants will know this and will be on their way out of dormancy. And, we have had springs when weather began to warm up in late February and into early March and then lo and behold, freezing temperatures for several nights occur in March. That's when damage can occur. But not now while the plants are dormant.

2025 Hosta of the Year – 'Skywriter'

The American Hosta Growers Association's 2025 Hosta of the Year is 'Skywriter' (Wols NR). This beautiful medium-sized hosta has ruffled soft blue leaves with white backs and purple petioles. Its parentage is H. 'Marilyn Monroe' x (H. 'Neptune' x H. 'Smoke Signals'). With those genes, you know it has to be good! It has proven to be a good grower all over the country, including here in the south. Attractive lavender flowers occur in late summer.





The American Hosta Society is proud to offer a tribute plant dedicated to the memory of our dear friend Dr. Robert Olson. As you know, Bob Olson passed away in 2022. Bob served the American Hosta Society (AHS) and both the Minnesota and Midwest Regional Hosta societies in many different roles over the years. He was past president of the AHS and served for many years as the editor of *The Hosta Journal*.

Bob wanted to encourage the next generation of hosta lovers to become active members in AHS. As one way of doing that, AHS is offering *Hosta* 'Bob Olson' for sale to members of all hosta societies. The proceeds from the sale of this plant will fund memberships in AHS for our next generation of hosta aficionados.



Hosta 'Bob Olson' was registered by Herb and Dorothy Benedict in 1995. It is a selfed cross of H. 'Yellow Splash', hybridized by Herb Benedict. It has a registered mature size of 12 inches in height and 36 inches in width. Specimens have been noted to grow somewhat larger than this, with a height of 15+ inches. It has dark green leaves with a slightly rippled, creamy white margin that fades to white as the season progresses. H. 'Bob Olson' has very limited commercial availability.

We are offering this plant to members of your local society. The plant is currently being grown out to a three-year-old plant for delivery in Spring 2025. The cost of the plant will be \$20.00, with all proceeds going to fund memberships in the American Hosta Society. You may preorder this plant for members of your society for delivery in the spring of 2025. Our most efficient way of delivering the plants to your local club will be to ship bare root to you for your distribution to your members. In this way we can save your members significant shipping costs. You can let us know how many plants your society wants this year. We will reserve them for you and will require payment in early 2025.

We also invite you to nominate <u>younger members</u> of your society to be recipients of a gifted membership in the American Hosta Society. Your candidates for membership should be members of your local society who are not current AHS members. You may nominate more than one of your members to receive this gifted membership.

THE GEORGIA HOSTA SOCIETY Minutes of General Meeting – November 9, 2024

The general body meeting was called to order by GHS President, Mark Malaguerra, at 11:28a on Saturday, November 9, 2024 in the Garden House at the Deen Day Sanders Estate.

Old Business:

- 1. Approval of minutes from last Board Meeting as published in the newsletter and was seconded by Dexter Henry.
 - a. The motion was carried with unanimous consent.

2. Treasurer's report

- a. Dexter Henry provided a brief overview of the current state of the GHS finances and asked for members to provide him with any receipts requiring reimbursement.
- b. Mark Malaguerra informed the general body that a donation to the Manna Community Food Bank in the amount of \$1,000 has been authorized by the GHS board. This non-profit agency is currently working to help people in Western NC who were affected by Hurricane Helene.

3. Proposed Bylaws Change

- a. Harold McDonell reviewed the proposed bylaws change that was published in the most recent newsletter. This change would clarify the number of terms that board members and officers may serve.
