## <u>Our Guest Speaker - Claude Carpenter</u> <u>Garden Photography Tips</u>

All of us want to take the best pictures of our garden subjects, don't we? With the addition of outstanding camera capabilities now available on our cell phones and picture adjustment apps on our computers, just about anyone can produce nice pictures. Our speaker, Claude Carpenter, will give us tips on how to take not just nice pictures, but rather produce the very best pictures possible.

Claude's photography interests started when he began to grow daylilies in 1996. He needed a record of what each cultivar looked like and he wanted a way to review the blooming habits of his daylilies. He purchased a camera and began to self-teach himself the methods and procedures for producing great pictures. Obviously, he was an excellent teacher because today he is recognized as an outstanding photographer. Still, he stresses that he is not a professional photographer. He considers photography a hobby along with growing his daylilies.

Over the years, Claude started sharing his photos with magazines and entered photo contests sponsored by the




American Daylily Society. His photos won numerous awards and many have been published in the *Daylily Journal*, the official publication of the ADS. Seven years ago, he became the editor of *The Georgia Daylily* and has used his photos extensively in support of that effort. He has edited one book published by ADS, *Small and Miniature Daylilies*, and is in the process of editing another book entitled *Double Daylilies – Twice the Fun*. 

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

#### Rob Mortko – the Tissue Culture Process

(Revised and reprinted from the St. Louis Hosta Society's newsletter, *Shady Notes*, Volume 23, Issue 10, December 2022)

Rob Mortko, owner of Made in the Shade Tissue Culture labs, presented the following tour of the tissue culture process, explaining each step of the labor-intensive process of creating many hostas from one.

Tissue culture (TC) is one method of propagating plants. It is not limited to hostas. There are several reasons why to use TC – speed of propagation, disease control, expense, and sport discovery.

Buds form around the edge of the hosta's crown. One of these buds along with a piece of the crown is surgically removed. This bud must be meticulously cleaned. Multiple layers of undeveloped leaves are peeled back. The bud is cleaned with a detergent wash and eventually soaked in a bleach solution. The idea is to remove all traces of soil, bacteria, fungi, nematodes and contaminates without killing the bud or damaging the meristem which is at the center of the bud. Tricky and time consuming.





The cleaned bud is placed in a vial containing the culture media. This media is a mixture of vitamins, hormones, sugar and a gel called agar. A hormone called cytokines is used to stimulate multiplication, while another called auxin triggers root development.

It is vital that all this work be done in a clean, sterile environment. All work surfaces and tools must be sterilized. Contaminates are everywhere, even the dust that circulates in the air. Many a batch of plants can be lost if a fungus or mold seeps into the vial



Every four to eight weeks, the plant will be removed from the vial and divided. Each division is then placed in its own clean vial with fresh media. At this point the plants have no roots and rely on the sugars in the media to survive and grow. Again. this division must be done in a sterile environment.

#### Rob Mortko - the Tissue Culture Process (continued)

It doesn't take long for the number of plants produced to reach into the hundreds. When the desired number of plants has been achieved, the hormones in the agar mixture are tweaked so that the plants develop roots instead of multiplying.

Once roots have developed, the plants are potted in 96 cell packs and placed in a greenhouse for further growth. Once they have attained liner size and are suitable for potting up and growing on, the clones are ready to be shipped to a grower.

The flats are placed in a plastic mesh before being packed in boxes. This is to prevent the plants from falling out of the trays if the boxes are not shipped "this side up". Typically, the grower will then tend the plants for another one or two years depending upon the growth rate of the particular hosta. Only then will the buying public see these plants at our local nurseries.

The plants resulting from this process are clones, exact replicas of the mother plant. This is vitally important when reproducing named cultivars. My H. 'Blue Mouse Ears' must be the same as yours.

Because of the various hormones used and the large numbers of plants produced, mutations, called sports, often occur. Each sport is a new variety which could itself be named and marketed. However, most of these sports are not distinctive enough to be worth the expense of further development and are relegated to the compost pile.

The hardest and most stressful part of this process seems to be creating and maintaining a highly sterile work area. Contamination can occur at any stage right up to the time the new plants are shipped to a grower. Talk about time and labor intensive! Constant vigilance is essential. A fungal infection can spell doom and waste months and months of work.

Thanks, Rob, for introducing us to your world. We will now think twice before complaining about the price of that special hosta.

## THE GEORGIA HOSTA SOCIETY MINUTES OF GENERAL MEETING Deen Day Sanders Garden House, Duluth, Georgia

April 15, 2023

President Greg Ferguson opened the meeting at 11:12 am by welcoming visitors and making announcements. The official business meeting began at 11:17 am.

Minutes of the February 11, 2023 general meeting and the March 18, 2023 board meeting were published in the March 2023 edition of *Georgia Hosta Notes*. Chuck Zdeb moved that the minutes be accepted as published; Fred Lindquist seconded the motion and it carried.

Treasurer Dexter Henry reported that the balance in our checking account at the end of March is \$1,888.12. The silent auction held at the February general meeting generated \$320. Today's plant auction should be our largest fund raiser of the year. (See below!)

Chuck Zdeb, representing the 2023 Show Committee, pleaded for member assistance in preparing display tables, leaf prep areas and vendor spaces on Friday, May 5, the day prior to the show. Those same functions will also need physical "teardown" help immediately after the show closing on May 6.

Kendra Spadoni, Ways and Means Chair, explained today's fund raising activities. Members have donated garden-related items which will be sold through a drawing. Tickets for a "50/50" raffle are available for \$1.00 each or 6 for \$5. A club shirt with GHS logo is available in various colors for \$30.

The 2023 Show newsletter will be distributed by email next week, according to Newsletter Editor Harold McDonell.

Both of our "official" club photographers (Harold McDonell and Mikky Lockwood) will be unavailable on the day of this year's show. Greg asked for a volunteer to take photos of member and vendor activities. Chuck Zdeb volunteered and was appointed.

Ida Beth Barner, representing the 2024 – 2025 nominating committee, pointed out that an email was recently sent to all members asking for nominees for all officer and board positions. A slate of prospective officers will be presented at the September general meeting.

Chuck Zdeb announced that Judges' Clinics I and II will be offered on April 29th at the Tucker Library. Those wishing to participate must bring an up-to-date American Hosta Society Judges' Handbook (available on the AHS website). Seven prospective attendees have registered with Chuck thus far.

Chuck also said that nationwide, only 5 hosta clubs are planning shows this year. In the past, there have been as many as 13 shows in one year. The genus hosta seems to be more popular than ever with home gardeners but club participation is declining.

There being no further business, Chuck moved that the meeting be closed and Fred seconded the motion. It was approved and the meeting adjourned at 11:32 am.

Following lunch, the annual plant auction was held. Income from the auction, the raffle and the 50/50 drawing totaled \$1,979!!

## THE GEORGIA HOSTA SOCIETY MINUTES OF BOARD MEETING August 19, 2023 Via Zoom

The meeting was called to order by President Greg Ferguson at 9:36 a.m. Participating in addition were: Judy Beeler, Sandra Bussell, Richard Jolly, Katie Lindquist, Mark Malaguerra, Harold McDonell, Becky Paris, Scott Smith, Kendra Spadoni, Claudia Walker and Chuck Zdeb.

Minutes of the March 18, 2023 board meeting were published in the March 2023 "Georgia Hosta Notes" newsletter. Chuck moved and Scott seconded that the minutes be accepted as published. The motion carried.

Greg announced that the certificates for this year's President's Wall awardees will be presented at the September 16 general meeting.

Dexter Henry was not in attendance but he had provided his treasurer's report in advance. Income continues to be strong and expenses are as anticipated. Proceeds from this year's show sales totaled more than \$1,500, thanks in part to having a new vendor selling companion plants. Expenditures for the show were under-budget.

Additional income was generated by Kendra's idea of selling club shirts which were produced by Greg Barner's company.

A major and ever-increasing expense has been monthly rent for the off-site storage unit used for safekeeping of show supplies. Dexter, Chuck and Greg Ferguson have purged no-longer-needed items and have physically moved the remaining items such as bottles and table coverings to a smaller and less expensive unit. THANKS to their efforts we will save \$636 per year on storage costs.

We discussed alternative storage methods but determined that the off-site facility remains the preferred method. We voted that going forward the cost of the storage facility should be considered a "cut leaf show" expense.

The speaker for our September general meeting will be Claude Carpenter, who will present a program on garden photography. Mr. Carpenter lives in the Atlanta area and has declined a speaker's fee. Mark moved that we donate an honorarium of \$150 to the Daylily Society of Greater Atlanta; Kendra seconded the motion and it was approved.

The September meeting will also include 50/50 and a silent auction.

For the November general meeting program, Scott will moderate a panel of our members answering questions submitted by attendees. Chuck will demonstrate the proper procedure for dividing a hosta.

Becky, representing the Nominating Committee, announced the proposed slate of officers for 2024 – 2025. Mark Malaguerra has consented to follow Greg Ferguson as president. Greg has reached the term limits as set by club by-laws. Other positions still needing to be filled are 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President for Programs, Secretary, and two Directors. The new slate of officers will be presented to the membership at the September general meeting and, if elected, installed at the November meeting.

The VP for Programs is responsible for arranging speakers or other agenda for the general meetings. This has been a difficult position to fill. Becky and her committee will attempt to fill it as "chair of the program committee" so that no one person bears the full responsibility. The nominating committee will also re-contact some active members to attempt to fill the director positions.

Becky, as 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President for Membership, has attempted to contact all persons currently on the club roster who have not paid dues for 2023. As a result, several have updated their membership. Current paid membership is 71 with an additional 9 honorary members.

At the next board meeting, we will discuss possibly raising dues.

#### MINUTES OF BOARD MEETING - August 19, 2023 (Continued)

Judy Burns will join the telephone committee which now includes Judy Beeler, Katie Lindquist, Becky Paris, Claudia Walker and Dexter. Dexter will soon contact the committee with new assignments.

Show Co-chair (for 2023) Sandra said that exhibitor contribution at this year's show was successful but member turnout was disappointing. We discussed reasons for such low involvement and methods to increase participation in the show and other events such as the garden tours. Vehicle congestion around the venue on show day may be a factor.

Show vendors have indicated that they cannot confirm that sales are related to Tucker Day activities. Therefore, we will no longer coordinate with Tucker Day, but will instead return to our former schedule of having the show and sale on Mother's Day weekend. The 2024 show date will be Saturday, May 11.

Show Co-chairs for 2024 Sandra and Dexter will be assisted by Kendra and Mark, who will in turn be Co-chairs of the 2025 show and sale.

The Judges' Training organized by Chuck in April was a great success. Five Master Judges with more than 100 years of combined experience provided the training. As a result, 4 or 5 new provisional judges will be available!

We discussed educational projects that might benefit from a donation for their training. Claudia will determine if Tucker High School has a horticulture program. Chuck will solicit ideas from the American Hosta Society Genus Hosta chair.

Next year's general meeting dates have been confirmed with Dean Day Sanders Garden House and are listed in the August newsletter.

Please continue to advise Claudia of any illness or life events affecting our members so that she may send appropriate notes.

The next board meeting will be October 7. The meeting adjourned at 11:17 am.
